### The Collect (Special Prayer for the day)

Lord Jesus Christ,

your birth at Bethlehem draws us to kneel in wonder at heaven touching earth:

accept our heartfelt praise as we worship you, our Saviour and eternal God. **Amen**

### Gospel Reading: Luke 2: 1-20

In those days a decree went out from Emperor Augustus that all the world should be registered. This was the first registration and was taken while Quirinius was governor of Syria. All went to their own towns to be registered. Joseph also went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to the city of David called Bethlehem, because he was descended from the house and family of David. He went to be registered with Mary, to whom he was engaged and who was expecting a child. While they were there, the time came for her to deliver her child. And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in bands of cloth, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn. In that region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. Then an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. But the angel said to them, 'Do not be afraid; for see—I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, who is the Messiah, the Lord. This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger.' And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God and saying, 'Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favours!'"

When the angels had left them and gone into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, 'Let us go now to Bethlehem and see this thing that has taken place, which the Lord has made known to us.' So they went with haste and found Mary and Joseph, and the child lying in the manger. When they saw this, they made known what had been told them about this child; and all who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds told them. But Mary treasured all these words and pondered them in her heart. The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen, as it had been told them.

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

**Praise to you O Christ.**

**Reflection on the Gospel.**

**“Behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all the people; for to you this day is born to you a Saviour who is Christ the Lord”.** I wonder how many times you have heard those words read or said at Christmas. Perhaps in church or on the radio, or perhaps going back to your children’s Nativity play at school, or even further back to your own school days. The words are extremely well known but have you really “heard” them? The angel does not simply say “Christ is born” but, **to you**, Christ is born. Neither does he say “I bring glad tidings” but, **“To you**, I bring, I bring glad tidings of great joy”. So whatever way you celebrate Christ’s birth today, and for most of us it will be in a quieter than usual way, celebrate in the knowledge that Jesus was born for **you**, the gift of eternal life is for **you**, the gift of God’s healing is for **you**, the gift of God’s forgiveness is for **you**. Not just some random person in the world, **but you**, that makes it personal and special! So celebrate the gift that God has given to us in Jesus, his life affirming ways, his teaching, his healing and his love. Jesus - the Christmas gift from God that just keep giving. Amen
